# **ALUM ROCK COUNSELING CENTER**FY 20-21 Annual Report, CEO Message

Dear ARCC Friends,

We thank you for your ongoing interest and support for and with Alum Rock Counseling Center (ARCC), particularly during this challenging time as our world continues to cope with the COVID-19 Pandemic. ARCC quickly pivoted our services last year, and we have continued to operate and provide services primarily remotely. Some of our changes in response to remote work included:

- 1. We meet with clients and participants via telehealth (I.e Facetime, Zoom), or outside in the community
- 2. We expanded outreach including making videos of our services
- We worked with our government funding partners to protect the staffing capacity we have, as there may be a tsunami of referrals when the pandemic subsides due to increased behavioral health needs
- 4. We were awarded \$62,000 to directly distribute to families in need of direct financial assistance due to the impact of COVID on their own incomes. This helped 49 families to pay rent, buy groceries, etc.

This is who we are: ARCC adapts quickly to serve the needs of our community, usually one child or family at a time , holding their hearts, helping them grow. It is an honor that our kids and families open their hearts with us, and allow us to support their healing from trauma and inspire them to reach their full potential.

Thank you for your part in helping ARCC help our community.

"When I started working with my counselor, I was getting bad grades, fighting all the time with my mom, and was angry a lot. #### **IMPACT**

#### FIRST 5 PROGRAM (ages 0-5)

 88% of families who needed support in communication & developing a better relationship with their child were able to successfully develop a loving relationship and include the child in activities

### SOCIAL EMOTIONAL ACADEMIC SERVICES (ages 6-21)

 100% of students with moderate or severe school behavior issues demonstrated improvement to behaving well or with only minor problems

### PREVENTION & EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM (ages 6-18)

 75% of youth demonstrated reduced severity of mental health conditions, including attachment disorders, conduct disorders, anxiety, depression & post-traumatic disorder

#### **SCHOOL LINKED SERVICES (students K-12)**

 82% of youth with school achievement challenges, including failing some or most classes for an extended time, improved to doing well or adequately

### MIDDLE SCHOOL MENTORING & SUPPORT (ages 11-14)

- 100% of 8th graders, who were enrolled for all three years of the program graduated from middle school
- 40% earned a place on the honor roll

#### **OUTPATIENT PROGRAM (ages 6-21)**

- 93% of youth who demonstrated unsafe behaviors (e.g., suicide risk, aggression towards others, activities potentially causing physical harm/ death) improved in all areas of need
- 75% of youth demonstrated improvement in family relationships, creating positive and stable family functioning in the home

#### SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION SERVICES

 76% of respondents reported that they learned how to support and protect themselves when around someone who uses substances

# WHO WE ARE & WHOM WE SERVE

#### **MISSION:**

The mission of Alum Rock Counseling Center (ARCC) is to heal families and inspire youth to reach their full potential. ARCC's 13 behavioral health and educational support programs target youth and families who often are trapped in unhealthy, multigenerational cycles of trauma, school failure, and poverty. By providing therapeutic care, tools and information, the agency's overarching goals are to interrupt these vicious cycles, heal family wounds, and keep high-risk youth safe, in school, and drug & violence free.

#### **VISION:**

Communities where help and support services are accessible and prosperity is possible.



#### **AREAS OF IMPACT**

ARCC works to ensure that:

- 1. Our youth and families have resources for overcoming behavioral health concerns including substance use and mental health challenges.
- 2. All of our kids are kindergarten ready.
- 3. Our youth graduate from middle school, high school and beyond.
- 4. Our youth and families are free from involvement with the justice and/or social services systems.
- 5. Our homes, schools and neighborhoods are safe free of violence and dangerous behaviors.




During FY2020-2021, ARCC provided services to over 6,000 youth and families in Santa Clara County, with 54% of clients living in the high-risk zip codes of 95111, 95116, 95122 and 95127 in East San Jose.

#### WE REFLECT THE COMMUNITY WE SERVE.

ARCC's staff is culturally diverse and reflective of the communities we serve, an intentional result of our hiring practices. Overall, 87% of ARCC's direct service staff is ethnically diverse and 65% are bilingual. Additionally, many practitioners have lived through the types of experiences their clients are working to overcome. This shared life experience – coming from a low-income family, being a first generation immigrant, raised by a single parent, recovering from substance abuse – helps build a sense of trust almost immediately, facilitating therapeutic progress and positive outcomes.
